

2.1.1 Proper use

The measuring light curtain is designed as a measuring and object-detecting, configurable, multi-sensor unit.

Areas of application

The measuring light curtain is designed for the measurement and detection of objects for the following areas of application in handling and warehousing systems, the packaging industry or a comparable environment:

- · Height measurement
- · Width measurement
- · Contour measurement
- · Orientation detection.

2.1.2 Foreseeable misuse

Any use other than that defined under the "Approved purpose" or which goes beyond that use is considered improper use.

In particular, use of the measuring light curtain is not permitted in the following cases:

- · Rooms with explosive atmospheres
- · Operation for medical purposes


3 Device description

3.1 General information

The light curtains of the CML series are designed as measuring and object-detecting, configurable, multi-sensor units. They monitor a measurement field and output measurement information from this field. Depending on the configuration and model, the devices are suitable for a variety of measurement tasks with various resolutions and can be integrated in different control environments.

The total system of the CML measuring light curtain consists of a transmitter and a receiver, including the connection cables.

- Transmitter and receiver are connected to one another via a synchronization cable.
- The integrated control panel with indicators and operational controls for configuring the total system is located on the receiver.
- The shared power supply is provided via connection X1 on the receiver.

3.2 General performance characteristics

The most important performance characteristics of the CML 730i series are:

- Operating range up to 8000 mm
- Measurement field length from 150 mm to 2960 mm
- Beam spacings of 5 mm, 10 mm, 20 mm, 40 mm
- Response time 10 µs per beam
- Operating modes: parallel-beam / diagonal-beam / crossed-beam
- Single-beam evaluation (beam stream)
- Evaluation functions: TIB, TNIB, LIB, LNIB, FIB, FNIB, status of beam areas 1 ... 32, status of the digital inputs/outputs
- Up to four digital inputs/outputs (configurable)
- · Local control panel with display
- Interfaces to the machine control: analog current/voltage output, IO-Link interface, CANopen, Profibus-DP
- Blanking of unnecessary beams
- · Smoothing for interference suppression
- · Cascading of multiple devices
- · Block evaluation of beam areas
- · Path functions
- · Detection of transparent media

3.3 Connection technology

The transmitter and receiver feature an M12 connector with the following number of pins:

3.4 Display elements

The display elements are used for start-up and error analysis.

Located on the receiver is a control panel with the following display elements:

- two LEDs
- · one OLED display, two-line

Located on the transmitter is the following display element:

· one LED

3.4.1 Operation indicators on the receiver control panel

Two function indicator LEDs are located on the receiver control panel.

3.4.2 Display on the receiver control panel

Located on the receiver is an OLED display which serves as a function indicator.

The type of display on the OLED display is different for the two following operating modes:

- · Alignment operation
- · Measurement operation

Display indicators in alignment operation

In alignment operation, the OLED display shows the received signal level of the first (FB) and last (LB) beam via two bar graph fields.





- 1 Optimally aligned light curtain
- 2 No reception signal from the first beam (FB); last beam optimally aligned
- 3 Marker for the minimum signal level which is to be achieved

Display indicators in measurement operation

In measurement operation, the upper line shows the number of interrupted beams (TIB) and the lower line shows the status of the inputs/outputs.



- 1 Number of interrupted beams
- 2 Logic state at pin 2 (0 = not active, 1 = active)
- 3 Logic state at pin 5 (0 = not active, 1 = active)
- 4 Logic state at pin 6 (0 = not active, 1 = active)
- 5 Logic state at pin 7 (0 = not active, 1 = active)

If the display is not actuated for several minutes, the display darkens and extinguishes. Press any button to again make the display visible. Settings for visibility, display duration, etc. can be changed via the Display menu.

3.4.3 Operating indicators on the transmitter

Located on the transmitter is an LED which serves as a function indicator.

3.7 Menu navigation on the receiver control panel

The vand buttons have different functions depending on the operating situation. These functions are displayed at the left edge of the display above the icons.


3.7.1 Meaning of the display icons

Icon	Position	Function
+	First line	Symbolizes that you can select the next parameter within a menu level by pressing the button on the second line.
	First line	Symbolizes the next higher menu level in which you are not currently navigating (not highlighted).
→	Second line	Symbolizes the respective, next option level that you have not yet selected (not highlighted).
+	Second line	Press the button to exit the menu level or the menu. Symbolizes a field that you can read but not change (e.g., in the "Information "menu).














3.7.5 Editing selection parameters

- Selects the "Positive PNP" menu item with the bright background.

4 Functions

This chapter describes fundamental and extended functions for adaptation to the respective application conditions and requirements.

4.1 Operating modes

4.1.1 Parallel-beam scanning

In parallel-beam operation, the light beam of each transmitter LED is detected by the directly opposing receiver diode.





Figure 4.1: Beam path in parallel-beam scanning mode

4.1.2 Diagonal-beam scanning

In diagonal-beam operation, the light beam of each transmitter LED is detected alternately by both the directly opposing receiver LED as well as by the receiver LED (n-1) adjacent to it (diagonal-beam path). This doubles the resolution in the middle between the transmitter and receiver.



1 Area with increased resolution

Figure 4.2: Beam path in diagonal-beam scanning mode

Calculation

The number of beams for diagonal-beam scanning n_d is calculated from the number of beams for parallel-beam scanning n_d .

Formula for calculating the number of beams for diagonal-beam scanning

$$n_d = 2n_p - 1$$

n_d [number] = number of beams for diagonal-beam scanning

n_o [number] = number of beams for parallel-beam scanning

Example: through the measurement configuration, 288 actual beams (parallel-beam scanning) become 575 beams (diagonal-beam scanning). With a beam spacing of 5 mm, this spacing is reduced to 2.5 mm in the center area.

The diagonal-beam scanning function can be activated via the configuration software from Leuze electronic (see chapter 14 "Connection to a PC") or via the respective fieldbus interface (see chapter 10 "Starting up the device - IO-Link interface" ff.).

NOTICE

Minimum distance for diagonal-beam scanning!

\$\footnote{\top} \text{ For diagonal-beam scanning, a minimum distance between transmitter and receiver must be maintained, whereby the values vary depending on beam spacing (see chapter 18 "Specifications").


NOTICE

Teach after changing the operating mode!

Perform a teach after changing the operating mode (see chapter 8.2 "Teaching the environmental conditions").

4.1.3 Crossed-beam scanning

The crossed-beam scanning function is available for increasing the resolution for a larger area of the measurement field. In crossed-beam operation, each light beam of the transmitter LED is detected alternately by both the directly opposing receiver diode as well as by the receiver diodes (n+1, n-1) adjacent to it.

Figure 4.3: Beam path in crossed-beam scanning mode

Calculation

The number of beams for crossed-beam scanning n_k is calculated from the number of beams for parallel-beam scanning n_0 .

Formula for calculating the number of beams for crossed-beam scanning

$$n_k = 3n_p - 2$$

n_k [number] = number of beams for crossed-beam scanning

n_o [number] = number of beams for parallel-beam scanning

The crossed-beam scanning function can be activated via the configuration software from Leuze electronic (see chapter 14 "Connection to a PC") or via the respective fieldbus interface (see chapter 10 "Starting up the device - IO-Link interface" ff.).

NOTICE

Minimum distance for crossed-beam scanning!

\$\forall \text{For crossed-beam scanning, a minimum distance between transmitter and receiver must be maintained, whereby the values vary depending on beam spacing (see chapter 18 "Specifications").

Example: through the measurement configuration, 288 actual beams (parallel-beam scanning) become 862 beams (crossed-beam scanning). With a beam spacing of 5 mm, this spacing is reduced to 2.5 mm in the center area.




4.2 Measurement beam sequence

By default, the counting direction of the beams begins at the sensor connection unit. It can, however, be reconfigured so that counting again begins with 1 in the case of light curtain that is situated "back to front". This simplifies handling if, e.g, two light curtains are arranged end-to-end in a cascading arrangement. The simplest application case for the inverted beam sequence is vertical mounting with the connection unit at the top, e.g., for height measurement, where beam 1 begins at the bottom, as shown below:




- a Receiver connection unit

Another variant with two successive light curtains, where the second is arranged "back to front" and counting again begins with 1, is illustrated as follows:



For width detection, counting begins on both ends with beam 1, as shown in the following:



The counting direction can be changed via the configuration software from Leuze electronic (see chapter 14 "Connection to a PC") or via the respective fieldbus interface (see chapter 10 "Starting up the device - IO-Link interface" ff.).

NOTICE

Inverted evaluation function!

♥ If the sequence is changed, the evaluation functions (FIB, LIB ...) are also inverted.

4.3 Beam stream





Figure 4.4: Illustration of a beam stream

A beam stream refers to the output of each individual beam in serial sequence ((see figure 4.4)). Uninterrupted beams (free beams) are represented as logical 1 in the output bit in this case.

The data is available via the configuration software from Leuze electronic (see chapter 14 "Connection to a PC") or via the respective fieldbus interface (see chapter 10 "Starting up the device - IO-Link interface" ff.).

For an example configuration, see chapter 13.4.2 "Configuration of blanking areas via IO-Link interface".

4.4 Evaluation functions

The information on the individual beam states (free/interrupted) can be evaluated in the CML and the result read out via various evaluation functions.

The evaluation functions include the functions shown in the following figure:



- 1 Number of all interrupted beams (TIB)
- 2 Number of all uninterrupted beams(TNIB)
- 3 Last interrupted beam (LIB)
- 4 Last uninterrupted beam (LNIB)
- 5 First uninterrupted beam (FNIB)
- 6 First interrupted beam (FIB)

Also included among the evaluation functions are:

- the area mappings to an output pin (status of beam areas 1 ... 32), as well as
- · the status of the digital inputs/outputs

For the area mappings to an output pin or the status of the digital inputs/outputs, see chapter 4.9 "Block evaluation of beam areas".

4.5 Hold function

This function can be used to temporarily store the measurement value over the defined hold time until it is ensured by means of the primary control that the measurement data was read.

The setting for the hold times is made via a control command or telegram via the configuration software from Leuze electronic (see chapter 14 "Connection to a PC") or via the respective field-bus interface (see chapter 10 "Starting up the device - IO-Link interface" ff.).

Temporary storage of the beam data during the hold time means that the beam data maxima and minima are stored for the following evaluation functions:

- · First interrupted beam (FIB)
- · First uninterrupted beam (FNIB)
- · Last interrupted beam (LIB)
- · Last uninterrupted beam (LNIB)
- · Number of all interrupted beams (TIB)
- Number of all uninterrupted beams(TNIB)


4.6 Blanking

During blanking, beams that are not to be included in the evaluation are suppressed. The numbering of the beams is not affected, i.e., the suppression of beams does not change the beam numbers.

If light curtains are installed such that existing frames / cross bars etc. continuously interrupt some beams, these beams must be suppressed.

- A maximum of four contiguous beam areas and a maximum of 50% of the existing beams can be suppressed.
- Beam suppression can be switched on and off via the configuration software from Leuze electronic (see chapter 14 "Connection to a PC") or via the respective fieldbus interface (see chapter 10 "Starting up the device IO-Link interface" ff.).

For an example configuration, see chapter 13.4 "Example configuration - activating and deactivating blanking areas".

4.6.1 Auto blanking during teaching

If there are obstacles present in the measurement field at the installation site and at least one blanking area is activated, interrupted beams can be mapped to the blanking area(s) during teaching. Existing settings for the blanking areas are then overwritten (see chapter 8.2 "Teaching the environmental conditions").

If no beams are interrupted during teaching, no blanking areas are configured.

NOTICE

Resetting all blanking areas!

♦ To deactivate blanking, configure the "number of blanking areas" = 0.


A new teach must then be performed.

4.7 Smoothing

With the smoothing function, interrupted beams are then only taken into account in the evaluation if the set minimum number of adjacent beams is reached. Individual interrupted beams that are not adjacent to one another do not result in beam evaluation.

Smoothing can be used, e.g., to suppress interference caused by spot soiling of the lens cover.

Smoothing "1" means that each object larger than a certain minimum size (dependent on beam spacing) is detected and measured.




Data output: beam number x interrupted

Figure 4.7: Smoothing configuration "1"


If, for example, "2" is set, individual, non-adjacent, interrupted beams are ignored.

If smoothing is set to a value of "3", for example, data is only output if at least 3 adjacent beams are interrupted.

♦ Values from 1 to 255 can be entered for smoothing.

Inverted smoothing

This inverts the function, i.e., if there are uninterrupted (free) beams between the first interrupted beam (FIB) and the last interrupted beam (LIB), these are not output until the configured smoothing value is reached or exceeded.


By inverting the smoothing function, it is possible to detect, e.g., only successive openings of a certain minimum size within a web. In this way, it is possible to easily detect, e.g., defined punchings in a material web.

4.8 Cascading/triggering

If the measurement field length of a light curtain is not sufficient for detecting a desired measurement path, multiple light curtains can be connected in series or cascaded. When doing so, it must be ensured that the light curtains do not mutually influence or interfere with one another. This is ensured by activating (triggering) with a time offset. Nearly any number of light curtains with different numbers of beams can be cascaded so that they do not mutually interfere with one another.

The following light curtain arrangements are possible in a cascade arrangement:


• Multiple light curtains above one another, e.g., for a height measurement along a transport system

Protection against mutual interference is realized through sequential activation of the light curtains.

Cascading via external trigger 4.8.1

Trigger In

Activation of the light curtain (or light curtains in the case of a cascaded arrangement) via the trigger input starts the measurement at a defined time in order to exclude mutual interference in the case of multiple light curtains in an application.

Arrangement for cascading via a trigger input

For an exact time assignment, it is possible to control the start of the measurement in a targeted manner. For external trigger activation, a trigger pulse generated in the PLC controls the start of the measurement. This trigger signal must be wired at all cascaded light curtains.

The selection of activation via an internal or external trigger signal is made via the configuration software from Leuze electronic (see chapter 14 "Connection to a PC") or via the respective field-bus interface (see chapter 10 "Starting up the device - IO-Link interface" ff.).




Figure 4.12: Cascading via external trigger

The individual light curtains are then configured in such a way that the respective measurement is performed with a time offset to the trigger ((see figure 4.12)).

NOTICE

Simultaneous activation of multiple light curtains, if spatially separated!

If the spatial configuration excludes mutual interference, multiple light curtains can also be activated simultaneously.

4.8.2 Cascading via internal trigger

Trigger Out

The trigger output of the CML makes the trigger signal necessary for "cascading via internal trigger" available at the master light curtain. The trigger output must be wired to the trigger inputs of the slave light curtains ((see figure 4.13)).

The cycle time of the respective light curtain can be taken over via the configuration software from Leuze electronic (see chapter 14 "Connection to a PC") or via the respective fieldbus interface (see chapter 10 "Starting up the device - IO-Link interface" ff.). In the case of the configuration software from Leuze electronic, the cycle time is located in the IODD file under "parameters" for device description - cycle time or, for the fieldbus interface, in the EDS/GSD file under a corresponding module.


Arrangement for cascading with internal trigger

With internal trigger activation, a CML configured as "master light curtain" generates the trigger pulse. This trigger pulse is continuous; this means that no further activation is required from a primary control. This signal is output on the "Trigger-Out" output. All cascaded light curtains receive this trigger via the trigger input and start the measurement according to the timing configuration.

The selection of activation via an internal or external trigger signal is made via the configuration software from Leuze electronic (see chapter 14 "Connection to a PC") or via the respective field-bus interface (see chapter 10 "Starting up the device - IO-Link interface" ff.).

For an example configuration, see chapter 13.5 "Example configuration - configuration of a cascade arrangement".


The following figure shows a wiring example for the cascading of three light curtains via internal trigger:

4.9 Block evaluation of beam areas

With this function, the quantity of data to be transmitted can be reduced by restricting the imaging accuracy. The minimum resolution of the light curtain is still retained.

To read out the beam states block-wise with a 16-bit or 32-bit word, the individual beams can be mapped to up to 32 areas independent of the maximum beam number. The individual beam information of grouped beams is linked to a logical bit, i.e., each area is represented as 1 bit.

The number of beams in an area can be freely defined. However, the beams must be adjacent to one another. The start beam and the end beam are to be defined as well as the conditions for switching of the area.

Depending on the version of the CML process interface, two or four pins can be configured as output at the X1 connection:

- · IO-Link device: four pins
- · Analog device and fieldbus device: two pins

NOTICE

Must be observed!

\$\text{The hold function (see chapter 4.5 "Hold function") also applies for this block evaluation of beam groups.

4.9.1 Mapping of beam areas to switching outputs

If grouping individual beams or if creating a block, the beam state of any number of adjacent beams (area) can be signaled at a switching output.

It is thereby possible

- to use a specific, single beam for an evaluation (e.g., as trigger signal for a primary control),
- to group the complete measurement field into one switching area and thereby signal at the switching output whether an object (at any position) is located in the measurement field,
- to configure up to 32 switching areas for a reference check or height verification; in many cases, this can make beam-data processing in the primary programmable logic control (PLC) unnecessary.

The switching conditions for the areas can be either AND or OR linked:

Logic function	Group bit [logic 1/0]	
AND	1	if all beams mapped to the area are interrupted
OR	1	if more than one beam is interrupted in the selected area

Areas may be sequential or overlapping. A maximum of 32 areas are available.

The switching behavior or the conditions for switching a switching output on and off can be defined via the configuration software from Leuze electronic (see chapter 14 "Connection to a PC") or via the respective fieldbus interface (see chapter 10 "Starting up the device - IO-Link interface" ff.).

For an example configuration, see chapter 13.4.3 "Configuration of blanking areas via CANopen interface".




Figure 4.15: Beam areas

NOTICE

Increased number of beams for the diagonal- or crossed-beam function!

➡ If the diagonal- or crossed-beam option is activated in beam mode (see chapter 4.1.2 "Diagonal-beam scanning" or see chapter 4.1.3 "Crossed-beam scanning"), the (increased) number of beams is to be taken into account.

4.9.2 Autosplitting

To read out the beam states block-wise with a 16-bit or 32-bit word, the individual beams can be mapped to up to 32 areas independent of the maximum beam number. The individual beam information of grouped beams is linked to a logical bit, i.e., each area is represented as 1 bit.

Procedure:

• Select the logic combination of the beams within the areas (logical AND / logical OR) Define the number of desired areas (e.g, 16 or 32)

The beams of the CML are automatically divided into the selected number of areas. The states of the areas generated in this way can be read out in the process data by means of the "Area Out - HiWord" and "Area Out - LoWord" parameters.

The autosplitting configuration can be defined via the configuration software from Leuze electronic (see chapter 14 "Connection to a PC") or via the respective fieldbus interface (see chapter 10 "Starting up the device - IO-Link interface" ff.).

4.10 Switching outputs

4.10.1 Light / dark switching

The output behavior of switching outputs Q1 to Q4 (or Q1 to Q2) can be configured with respect to light/dark switching. The setting ex works is "light switching", i.e., the outputs are activated if the light paths are free and become inactive if an object is detected in the measurement field.

The output behavior can be changed to "dark switching" via the receiver control panel and via the configuration software from Leuze electronic (see chapter 14 "Connection to a PC") or via the respective fieldbus interface (see chapter 10 "Starting up the device - IO-Link interface" ff.).

4.10.2 Time functions

Each of the individual switching outputs can be assigned one of the time functions described in the following table.

Time function	Selectable duration	Description
Start-up delay	0 65 s	Time that the sensor delays the start-up process after detecting an object. By means of a start-up delay, it is possible to suppress, e.g., upward-protruding packaging remnants (stretch wrap, etc.) during pallet height verification.
Switch-off delay	0 65 s	Time that the sensor delays the switching back of the output if the object leaves the detection range.
Pulse stretching	0 65 s	Minimum time that the state of the output is retained independent of what the sensor detects during this time. Pulse stretching is necessary for, e.g., hole recognition if the PLC cycle time does not register short pulses.
Pulse suppression	0 65 s	Minimum time that a measurement signal must be present in order for the output to switch. Short interference pulses are thereby suppressed.

The various time functions can be configured via the configuration software from Leuze electronic (see chapter 14 "Connection to a PC") or via the respective fieldbus interface (see chapter 10 "Starting up the device - IO-Link interface" ff.).


4.11 Interference suppression (filter depth)

To suppress any faulty measurement values caused by interference (ambient light, increased electromagnetic compatibility (EMC), ...), a threshold for data output can be defined. This threshold corresponds to the "filter depth".

"Filter depth" means that an interrupted/free beam is not included in the further data evaluation until the same beam status is recorded for the set number of measurement cycles.

Filter depth "1" = the beam states of each measurement cycle are output.

Filter depth "3" = only those beam states that were stable over three measurement cycles are output.



5 Applications

The following typical applications with corresponding evaluation function (see chapter 4 "Functions") exist for the measuring light curtain.

5.1 Height measurement




Figure 5.4: Contour measurement




Figure 5.5: Gap control/gap measurement

- For hole recognition within a web material, an area must be defined over the start beam and end beam and mapped to an output. All beams in this area are interrupted. If a beam is "free", the output switches (inverted OR).
- ♦ If you would like to dynamically track the area (e.g., if the web edge wanders slightly), the area can be "tracked" by means of Start Beam = first interrupted beam (i.e., FIB) and End Beam = last interrupted beam (i.e., LIB).

6 Mounting and installation

6.1 Mounting the light curtain

NOTICE

No reflective surfaces, no mutual interference!

- Avoid reflective surfaces near the light curtains.
 - Objects may otherwise not be precisely detected due to halation.
- \$ Ensure sufficient distance, suitable positioning or partitioning.
 - Optical sensors (e.g., other light curtains, photoelectric sensors, etc.) must not interfere with one another.
- \$\to\$ Avoid interference from outside light (e.g., from flash lamps, direct sunlight) on the receiver.
- It is possible to achieve this by ensuring sufficient spacing, suitable positioning or partitioning.


Mount the transmitter and receiver as follows:

- Select the fastening type for transmitter and receiver.
 - Fastening via the T-groove on one side of the standard profile (see chapter 6.3 "Fastening via sliding blocks").
 - Fastening via the rotating bracket on the ends of the profile (see chapter 6.4 "Fastening via swivel mount").
 - Fastening via the swiveling mounting brackets or parallel brackets (see chapter 6.5 "Fastening via swiveling mounting brackets").
- Have a suitable tool at hand and mount the sensors in accordance with the notices regarding the mounting locations.
- Mount the transmitter and receiver at the same height or with the same housing reference edge, free of tension and with the base in full contact with the mounting surface.

NOTICE

Must be observed!

- ♦ For horizontally mounted sensors with lengths of more than 2 m, use an additional mounting bracket in the middle of the sensors.
- \$\text{The optical surfaces of transmitter and receiver must be parallel to and opposite one another.}
- \$ The transmitter and receiver connections must point in the same direction.
- Secure transmitter and receiver against turning or sliding.

Figure 6.1: Arrangement of transmitter and receiver


To achieve the maximum operating range limit, transmitter and receiver must be aligned with one another as accurately as possible.

After mounting, you can electrically connect (see chapter 7 "Electrical connection") and start up (see chapter 8 "Starting up the device - Basic configuration") the measuring light curtain.

6.2 Definition of directions of movement

С

The following terms for alignment movements of the sensor around one of its axes are used:



- a Sliding: movement along the longitudinal axis
- b Turning: movement around the longitudinal axis
 - Tilting: lateral turning movement diagonal to the lens cover
- d Pitching: lateral turning movement in the direction of the lens cover

6.3 Fastening via sliding blocks

By default, transmitter and receiver are delivered with two sliding blocks each in the side groove (see chapter 19 "Ordering information and accessories").

Fasten transmitter and receiver to the machine or system via the lateral T-groove with M6 screws.

 \bigcap Sliding in the direction of the groove is possible, but turning, tilting and pitching is not.




Figure 6.3: Mounting via sliding blocks

6.4 Fastening via swivel mount

When mounting with the BT-2R1 swivel mount ((see table 19.10)), sold separately, the sensor can be aligned as follows:

- · Sliding through the vertical threaded holes in the wall plate of the swivel mount
- Turning by 360° around the longitudinal axis by fixing on the screw-on cone
- · Tilting around main axis
- · Pitching through horizontal threaded holes in the wall mounting

The wall mounting through threaded holes makes it possible to lift the mounting bracket over the connection cap after the screws have been loosened. Therefore, the mounting brackets do not need to be removed from the wall when exchanging the device. Loosening the screws is sufficient.




Figure 6.4: Mounting via swivel mount

6.4.1 One-sided mounting on the machine table

The sensor can be mounted directly on the machine table via an M5 screw on the blind hole in the end cap. On the other end, a BT-2R1 swivel mount can be used, for example, so that turning movements for alignment are possible despite the fact that the sensor is mounted on one side.

NOTICE

Avoid reflection bypasses at the machine table!

Make sure that reflections on the machine table are prevented reliably.




Figure 6.5: Mounting directly on the machine table

6.5 Fastening via swiveling mounting brackets

When mounting with the BT-2SSD/BT-4SSD or BT-2SSD-270 swiveling mounting brackets ((see table 19.10)), sold separately, the sensor can be aligned as follows:

- · Sliding in the direction of slot
- Turning +/- 8° around the longitudinal axis

The BT-SSD swiveling mounting brackets are also equipped with a vibration damper.

7 Electrical connection

7.1 Connection cables

Use only the cables listed in the accessories (see chapter 19 "Ordering information and accessories") for all connections (connection cable, analog/IO-Link/fieldbus connection cable, cable between transmitter and receiver).

Use only shielded cables for the cable between transmitter and receiver.

NOTICE

Competent persons and approved purpose!

- \$ Only allow competent persons to perform the electrical connection.
- Select the functions so that the measuring light curtain can be used as intended (see chapter 2.1 "Approved purpose and foreseeable improper operation").



- Tighten the small Allen screw to ensure a secure connection between the grounding slot nut and housing.
- \$\text{Connect connection X1 to the power supply and the control using the appropriate connection cable.}
- ♦ Connect connection X2 to connection X3 using the appropriate connection cable.








Figure 7.3: Input/output schematic diagram






7.4 Electrical connection of the system components for fieldbus devices

The electrical connection is established in the same way for all fieldbus devices.

Ground the light curtain before establishing an electrical connection or connecting the voltage supply. Connect the transmitter and receiver housing to the protective conductor on the machine star point via the PE screw on the grounding slot nut.

Tighten the small Allen screw to ensure a secure connection between the grounding slot nut and housing.

- Connect connection X1 with the Y-connection cable; connect the short end to the power supply or configuration software interface and connect the long end to connection X3 on the transmitter.
- Solution Connection X2 on the receiver with the Y-connection cable; use both ends to connect to BUS IN or BUS OUT on the other network devices.







8 Starting up the device - Basic configuration

The basic configuration includes the alignment of transmitter and receiver and the basic configuration steps via the receiver control panel.

The following optional basic functions are available for operation and configuration via the receiver control panel:

- · Define digital inputs/outputs
- · Defining the filter depth
- · Defining the display properties
- · Changing the language
- · Product information
- · Resetting to factory settings

8.1 Aligning transmitter and receiver

NOTICE

Alignment during start-up!

The alignment performed during start-up should only be performed by qualified personnel.

\$ Observe the data sheets and mounting instructions of the individual components.

Prerequisites:

- The measuring light curtain has been mounted (see chapter 6 "Mounting and installation") and connected (see chapter 7 "Electrical connection") correctly.
- Switch on the measuring light curtain.

NOTICE

Alignment operation!

\$\text{When switched on for the first time ex works, the sensor automatically starts in alignment operation.}

You can switch from measurement operation to alignment operation via the menu.

☼ Check whether the green LEDs on the receiver control panel and transmitter illuminate continuously.
The display shows the alignment state of the first beam (FB) and last beam (LB) beam via two bar graph fields.

Align the light curtain.

Loosen the screws only enough so that the devices can just be moved.

- Urn or slide the transmitter and receiver until the optimum position is reached and the bar graph indicators show the maximum value for the alignment.
- Align the transmitter and receiver with one another until the maximum value of the respective bar graph indicator is reached for the alignment of the first beam (FB) and the last beam (LB).



NOTICE

Minimum sensitivity of the sensor!

b In order to perform a teach, a minimum level must be reached in the bar graph indicator.

☼ Tighten the fastening screws of the transmitter and receiver.

Transmitter and receiver are aligned.

Switching to measurement operation

After aligning, switch to measurement operation.


♦ Select Main Settings > Mode > Operation.

The display in the receiver of the measuring light curtain shows the measurement operation states with the number of all interrupted beams (TIB) and the logic states of all four inputs/outputs (IOs).




Switching to alignment operation

You can switch from measurement operation to alignment operation via the menu.

Select Main Settings > Mode > Alignment.

The next configuration step is teaching the environmental conditions (teach).

8.2 Teaching the environmental conditions

During teaching, the system checks whether the signals of all beams are within a certain corridor.

This means that a teach event generally regulates all beams to the preset performance reserve for the current operating range. This ensures that all beams exhibit an identical switching behavior.

The performance reserve can be set to four levels:

- · High performance reserve
- Medium performance reserve
- · Low performance reserve
- · Transparent objects

Teaching can be triggered:

- · via the control panel
- via the teach input (if configured)
- via the fieldbus interface (IO-Link, CANopen, Profibus)
- via the configuration interface (IO-Link connected to the PC)

In addition, teaching is also possible with free light paths (without blanking) and with obstacles in the light path (auto blanking).

Depending on the PLC configuration interface (for IO-Link or fieldbus), it is possible, for example, to make the following parameter settings via the configuration software from Leuze electronic (see chapter 14 "Connection to a PC") or via the respective fieldbus interface (see chapter 10 "Starting up the device - IO-Link interface" ff.):

The sensitivity levels (e.g., high performance reserve for stable operation, medium performance reserve and low performance reserve) are configured ex works with "high performance reserve for stable operation". The "low performance reserve" configuration enables the detection of partially transparent objects.

Selection of whether the teach values are to be stored permanently or only temporarily (while the operating voltage is applied). The configuration ex works is for permanent (non-volatile) storage.

A teach event can be performed both directly from measurement operation as well as from alignment operation.

NOTICE

Perform teach after configuring performance reserve!

\$ A teach is to be performed after changing the performance reserve.

A teach is also always to be performed after changing the beam scanning mode (parallel-/diagonal-/crossed-beam).

Prerequisites:

- The measuring light curtain must be correctly aligned (see chapter 8.1 "Aligning transmitter and receiver").
- · The bar graph indicator must show a minimum level.
- ♦ You can use one of the following teach types:
 - Teach via receiver control panel (see chapter 8.2.1 ,- Teach via receiver control panel").
 - Teach via teach input (see chapter 8.2.2 "Teaching via a control signal from the control").
 - Teach via fieldbus interface (IO-Link, CANopen, Profibus) (see chapter 10 "Starting up the device IO-Link interface", see chapter 11 "Starting up the device CANopen fieldbus interface", see chapter 12 "Starting up the device Profibus fieldbus interface").
 - Teach via the configuration interface (IO-Link connected to PC) (see chapter 14 "Connection to a PC").

8.2.1 - Teach via receiver control panel

If blanking areas are configured via the configuration software interface, a teach event is performed that takes these blanking areas into account (blanking teach or auto blanking, see chapter 4.6 "Blanking").

NOTICE

Conditions for performing a teach!


- When teaching without preconfigured blanking areas, the light path must always be completely free. A teaching error will otherwise occur.
- If the light path is partially interrupted by structural elements, the permanently interrupted beams can be suppressed by means of blanking. To automatically suppress the affected beams during teaching, the number of blanking areas is to be configured via the configuration software interface (see chapter 4.6.1 "Auto blanking during teaching").
 - During a blanking teach or auto blanking, an "additional distance" is always added to the beams detected as interrupted. Safer operation is thereby achieved, e.g., in the case of vibrating guides, etc., in the "blanked" area.

Optimization of the blanked beams is to be performed via a software interface configuration.

A maximum of four adjacent areas of suppressed beams (blanking areas) can be configured.

A maximum of 50% of the existing beams can be suppressed.

The structure of the configuration in the receiver control panel menu is as follows:



♦ Select Main Settings > Command > Teach.

♦ Press the → button to execute the teach.

The display shows

Waiting

If the teach was started while in measurement operation, the display returns to the measurement operation display after a successful teach (see chapter 8.1 "Aligning transmitter and receiver").

If the teach was started from alignment operation, the display returns to the bar graph display following a successful teach and shows the received signal level of the first beam (FB) and the last beam (LB) as bars in the bar graph (see chapter 8.1 "Aligning transmitter and receiver").

If teach is successful, both bars display the maximum value.

If no bars are visible in the bar graph display for the first beam (FB) and the last beam (LB), an error has occurred. It is possible, e.g., that the reception signal is too low. You can correct errors according to the error list (see chapter 15 "Troubleshooting").

The next configuration step is to check the alignment.

8.2.2 Teaching via a control signal from the control

Teach input (Teach In)

This input can be used to perform a teach following initial commissioning, change of the alignment or during operation. During this procedure, the transmitter and receiver adjust themselves to the maximum performance reserve according to the distance.

To trigger a teach, a pulse must be applied on the X1 connection on the receiver IO1 = pin 2 (factory setting) for longer than 20 ms ... but less than 80 ms.

Depending on the configuration (PNP or NPN), this corresponds to the following signal response:





Figure 8.5: Control signals for line teach with PNP configuration

Performing a teach via the line input

NOTICE

Conditions for performing a teach via the line input (teach-in)

\$ For teaching, the light path must always be completely free; otherwise a teaching error occurs.

Prerequisites:

- The measuring light curtain must be correctly aligned (see chapter 8.1 "Aligning transmitter and receiver").
- A connection must be established between PLC and the line input (teach-in).
- Send a teach signal to the teach input via the control (see *** 'Teach input (Teach In)' on page 54 *** for the data) to trigger a teach.

The display on the receiver control panel shows

Waiting

Following a successful teach, the display switches back to the bar graph diagram (alignment mode). If teach is successful, both bars display the maximum value.

The next configuration step is to check the alignment.

8.3 Check alignment

Prerequisites:

- The measuring light curtain must first be correctly aligned and a teach must be performed.
- \$\text{Check whether the green LEDs on the receiver control panel and transmitter illuminate continuously.}
- Use the bar graph indicator to check whether the light curtain is optimally aligned, i.e., whether the maximum bar graph indicator is reached for both the first beam (FB) and the last beam (LB).
- Use the bar graph indicator to check the optimum alignment of the measuring light curtain if you have corrected an error that occurred.

The next configuration steps:

- Perform extended configurations on the receiver control panel if necessary (see chapter 8.4 "Extended configurations on the receiver control panel menu")
- Start up CML light curtains with analog output (see chapter 9 "Starting up the device Analog output")
- Start up CML light curtains with IO-Link interface (see chapter 10 "Starting up the device IO-Link interface")
- Start up CML light curtains with CANopen interface (see chapter 11 "Starting up the device CANopen fieldbus interface")
- Start up CML light curtains with Profibus interface (see chapter 12 "Starting up the device Profibus fieldbus interface")

8.4 Extended configurations on the receiver control panel menu

It is not mandatory that extended configurations be performed on the receiver control panel menu for all process interface types in order to start up a measuring light curtain.

8.4.1 Define digital inputs/outputs

The parameters for the switching outputs are configured with the IO logic, IO pin x (for IO-direction, inversion, input function, output function, area logic, start beam, end beam) configurations.

The individual configuration steps are not described separately for the extended configuration combinations.

When configuring start and end beam, you can configure values of up to 1776. Values above 1776 (to 1999) are not accepted and must be entered again.

The structure of these configurations in the receiver control panel menu is as follows (multiple configurations displayed simultaneously):





8.4.3 Defining the filter depth


The filter depth is configured with this configuration. The filter depth is used to specify that an evaluation of the measurement values occurs only once the beam states are stable over multiple measurement cycles.

Example: with a filter depth of 5, five measurement cycles must be consistent before a beam evaluation is performed. For further information, see also the description of interference suppression (see chapter 4.11 "Interference suppression (filter depth)").

For all digital process interface types, the configuration can also be performed via the configuration software from Leuze electronic (see chapter 14 "Connection to a PC") or via the respective fieldbus interface (see chapter 10 "Starting up the device - IO-Link interface" ff.).

When configuring the filter depth, you can enter values of up to 255. Values above 255 (to 299) are not accepted and must be entered again.

The structure of the configuration in the receiver control panel menu is as follows:



♦ Select Main Settings > Filter Depth.

8.4.4 Defining the display properties

With these configurations for the display, the brightness and a time unit for darkening the display are defined.

Visibility:

- Off: no display; the display remains dark until a button is pressed.
- Dark: text is only slightly visible.
- Normal: text is visible with good contrast.
- Bright: text appears very bright.
- **Dynamic**: The display darkens successively over the course of the number of seconds configured under **Time unit**. During this time span, the display passes through all levels, from **bright** to **off**.
- After approx. 5 minutes without button actuation, configuration mode is exited and the display changes to the previous mode.


In the **dark**, **normal** and **bright** modes, the display is completely inverted after approx. 15 minutes to prevent the LEDs from burning in.

When configuring the time unit (s), you can enter values of up to 240 seconds. Values above 240 (to 299) are not accepted and must be entered again.





9 Starting up the device - Analog output

9.1 Analog output configuration on the receiver control panel

The configuration of the analog output involves the following steps on the receiver control panel.

The configurations can be performed via the receiver control panel or the IO-Link Device Tool (with connection to the PC). These configurations are stored in non-volatile memory so that they are retained the next time the device is switched on.

It is always the last-made settings which are active.


General prerequisites:

- The measuring light curtain has been mounted (see chapter 6 "Mounting and installation") and connected ((see chapter 7)) correctly.
- The basic configuration has been performed (see chapter 8 "Starting up the device Basic configuration").

Configuration of analog signal, analog function, characteristic curve (start beam / end beam)

The following example shows the configuration of an analog output to 4 ... 20 mA. Current output pin 7 supplies an analog output signal depending on the first (FIB) interrupted beam. The measurement range goes from beam no. 1 ... 32.

9.2 Analog output configuration via the IO-Link configuration interface

The configuration of the analog output involves the following steps in the configuration software from Leuze electronic (see chapter 14 "Connection to a PC").

The configurations that are available in the IODD file via the configuration software from Leuze electronic (see chapter 14 "Connection to a PC"), can, in part, also be performed via the receiver control panel. Both configuration types are stored in non-volatile memory so that they are retained the next time the device is switched on.

It is always the last set configurations which are active. If the last changes to the configuration were made via the receiver control panel, any settings changed via, e.g., the control or PC are overwritten.

General prerequisites:

- The measuring light curtain has been mounted (see chapter 6 "Mounting and installation") and connected (see chapter 7 "Electrical connection") correctly.
- The measuring light curtain is connected to a PC via an IO-Link USB master (see chapter 14 "Connection to a PC").
- The IO-Link device configuration software (incl. device-specific IODD file) is installed on the PC.
- The basic configuration has been performed (see chapter 8 "Starting up the device Basic configuration").
- The IO-Link Device Description (IODD) can be used both with connected light curtain for direct configuration as well as without connected light curtain for creating device configurations.

An IODD file is supplied with the product. It can also be downloaded from the Internet.

- ♦ Open the configuration software.
- Solution Configure the following parameters:
 - Smoothing (definition of a beam number for which no object detection is yet detected)
 - Type of analog signal (not active; or selection of defined voltage level and/or current level) (see chapter 9 "Starting up the device Analog output")
 - Type of analog function (not active; or FIB; FNIB; LIB; LNIB; TIB; TNIB) (see chapter 9 "Starting up the device Analog output")
 - Characteristic curve configuration (start beam and end beam) (see chapter 9 "Starting up the device Analog output")
 - Filter depth (definition of a minimum number of measurement cycles after which beam evaluation is performed)
- ♦ If necessary, configure additional parameter/process data with the aid of the process data table (see chapter 10.3 "Parameter/process data for IO-Link").
- Save the configuration in the light curtain.
 - After the IODD file has been transmitted from the PC to the CML, the updated configurations are active.


The IO-Link-specific configurations have been performed, copied to the CML and the CML is ready for measurement operation.

9.3 Behavior of the analog output

The output logic of the CML returns the output signals to the programmable logic control (PLC). On the X1 interface, two pins can be assigned as output for the analog control of the PLC process interface.

The selected beam area (start beam/end beam) is mapped to the analog output of the CML. The conversion is by means of a 12-bit D/A converter, whereby the 12-bit value (4096) is divided by the selected number of beams. The resulting values, mapped to the respective, configured analog values, yield the characteristic curve. If there are only a few beams, this results in an erratic characteristic curve.


The beams used for the measurement can be freely defined from 1 to n via the receiver control panel. It is also possible to specify that only a part of the beam area be used for the measurement.

Both configuration types are stored in non-volatile memory so that they are retained the next time the device is switched on.

It is always the last set configurations which are active. If the last changes to the configuration were made via the receiver control panel, any settings changed via, e.g., the control or PC are overwritten.



 - · IO-Link baud rate selected
 - · IO-Link PD length selected



The IO-Link Device Description (IODD) can be used both with connected light curtain for direct configuration as well as without connected light curtain for creating device configurations.

An IODD file is supplied with the product. It can also be downloaded from the Internet.

NOTICE

Configuration dependent on the configuration software!

The sequence of the configurations is dependent on the specific configuration software.

- \$ Open the configuration software of the IO-Link master module.
- ♦ Configure the following parameters:
 - Operating mode (parallel-beam; diagonal-beam; crossed-beam)
 - Blanking areas
- Perform a teach.
- ♦ If necessary, configure additional parameter/process data (see chapter 10.3 "Parameter/process data for IO-Link").
- \$ Save the configuration.

The IO-Link-specific configurations have been performed, copied to the CML and the CML is ready for measurement operation.

10.3 Parameter/process data for IO-Link

In the standard design (factory setting), the light curtain cyclically transfers a data packet of 2 bytes at a baud rate of 38.4 k (COM2) to the IO-Link master module.

The parameter- and process data are described in the IO-Link Device Description (IODD) file.

Details on the parameters and on the structure of the process data can be found in the .html document, which is contained in the IODD zip file.

11 Starting up the device - CANopen fieldbus interface

The configuration of a CANopen fieldbus interface involves the following steps on the receiver control panel and in the fieldbus-specific configuration software.

The configurations that are available in the EDS file via the fieldbus-specific configuration software can, in part, also be performed via the receiver control panel. Both configuration types are stored in non-volatile memory so that they are retained the next time the device is switched on.


It is always the last set configurations which are active. If the last changes to the configuration were made via the receiver control panel, any settings changed via, e.g., the control or PC are overwritten.

General prerequisites:

- The measuring light curtain has been mounted (see chapter 6 "Mounting and installation") and connected (see chapter 7 "Electrical connection") correctly.
- The basic configuration has been performed (see chapter 8 "Starting up the device Basic configuration").

11.1 Defining the CANopen basic configuration on the receiver control panel

The parameters for the CANopen interface are defined with the node ID and baud rate configurations. The structure of these configurations in the receiver control panel menu is as follows:



Prerequisites:

- The measuring light curtain must be correctly aligned (see chapter 8.1 "Aligning transmitter and receiver").
- The measuring light curtain must be correctly taught (see chapter 8.2 "Teaching the environmental conditions").

The following procedure describes the configurations for CANopen interfaces.

♦ Select Main Settings > CANopen > Node ID.

♦ Select Main Settings > CANopen > Baud rate.

The CANopen address (Node ID) and baud rate have been configured.

Possible additional configuration steps are performed within the configuration software for the fieldbus-specific interface.

11.2 Configurations with the fieldbus-specific software

- The CANopen-specific EDS file must be installed on the PC.
- The CANopen Device Description (EDS) can be used both with connected light curtain for direct configuration as well as without connected light curtain for creating device configurations.

An EDS file is supplied with the product. It can also be downloaded from the Internet at www.leuze.com.

NOTICE

Configuration dependent on the fieldbus-specific software!

- The sequence of the configurations is dependent on the fieldbus-specific software.
- \$\footnote{\text{First configure the EDS file while off-line.}}
- Once all parameters have been configured, transmit them to the CML.

Standard procedure for the TPDO mapping:

- \$\ Set the device to the "Preoperational" state.
- ♦ In the desired TPDO 1 ... 4 (objects 1800 ... 1803 "PDO Mapping Entry"), set the COB-ID (sub-index 1) to 0x80000xxx (where the xxx part is node-dependent) and transmit this COB-ID to the device.
 - This sets the invalid bit, thereby making the TPDO entry invalid.
- ♦ In the desired TPDO mapping entry (objects 1A00 ... 1A03 "PD 01 to PD 04"), set the entry for the number of following elements (sub-index 0, "numOfEntries") to 0 and transmit this to the device.
 - An existing mapping is thereby deleted.
- Then reset this entry to the number of desired mapping elements, whereby a maximum of 4 elements are possible.
 - Transmit this entry back to the device.
- Set the mapping entries to the desired values. Each of the mapping sub-indices contains a 32-bit value that is structured as follows: SDO object number, sub-index and length. Normally (depending on the used master), the respective settings can be selected from a list.
- \$ After completing the mapping, transmit the complete TPDO mapping object to the device.
- ♦ In the TPDO object (objects 1800-1803 "PDO Mapping Entry"), set the transmission type (sub-index 2 "Transmission Type") and, if applicable, the event timer (sub-index 5, "Event Timer").
- In the same TPDO object, set the COB-ID (sub-index 1) to 0x00000xxx (where the xxx part is node-dependent) and transmit the complete TPDO object including all sub-indices to the device. This sets the valid bit, thereby making the TPDO entry valid.
- Set the device to the "Operational" state.
 - Depending on the set operating mode, the device will then begin to send PDOs.

12 Starting up the device - Profibus fieldbus interface

The configuration of a Profibus fieldbus interface involves the following steps on the receiver control panel and in the fieldbus-specific configuration software.

The configurations that are available in the GSD file via the fieldbus-specific configuration software can, in part, also be performed via the receiver control panel. Both configuration types are stored in non-volatile memory so that they are retained the next time the device is switched on.


It is always the last set configurations which are active. If the last changes to the configuration were made via the receiver control panel, any settings changed via, e.g., the control or PC are overwritten.

General prerequisites:

- The measuring light curtain has been mounted (see chapter 6 "Mounting and installation") and connected (see chapter 7 "Electrical connection") correctly.
- The basic configuration has been performed (see chapter 8 "Starting up the device Basic configuration").

12.1 Defining the Profibus basic configuration on the receiver control panel

The parameters for the Profibus interface are defined with the slave address and baud rate configurations. The structure of these configurations in the receiver control panel menu is as follows:



Prerequisites:

- The measuring light curtain must be correctly aligned (see chapter 8.1 "Aligning transmitter and receiver").
- The measuring light curtain must be correctly taught (see chapter 8.2 "Teaching the environmental conditions").

The following procedure describes the configurations for Profibus interfaces.

♦ Select Main Settings > Profibus > Slave Address.

♦ Select Main Settings > Profibus > Baud Rate.

The Profibus address and baud rate are configured.

Possible additional configuration steps are performed within the configuration software for the fieldbus-specific interface.

12.2 Configurations with the fieldbus-specific software

General prerequisites:

- The measuring light curtain has been mounted (see chapter 6 "Mounting and installation") and connected (see chapter 7 "Electrical connection") correctly.
- The fieldbus-specific configuration software has been installed on the PC.
- The basic configuration has been performed (see chapter 8 "Starting up the device Basic configuration").
- The Profibus basic configurations have been performed:
 - · Profibus address selected
 - · Profibus baud rate selected

Specific prerequisites:

- The Profibus-specific GSD file must be installed on the PC.
- The Profibus Device Description (GSD) can be used both with connected light curtain for direct configuration as well as "off-line" without connected light curtain for creating device configurations.

The GSD file is supplied with the product. It can also be downloaded from the Internet at "www.leuze.com".

NOTICE

Configuration dependent on the fieldbus-specific software!

- \$ The sequence of the configurations is dependent on the fieldbus-specific software.
- \$\infty\$ First configure the GSD file while off-line.
- ♥ Once all parameters have been configured, transmit them to the CML.
 - Information on using the configuration parameters can be found in the general descriptions of the individual functions of the CML (see chapter 4 "Functions").
- \$ Open the interface software.
- Strategies Configure the following configuration parameters:
 - Operating mode (parallel-beam; diagonal-beam; crossed-beam)
 - Blanking areas
- ♥ Perform a teach.
- If necessary, configure additional parameter/process data (see chapter 12.3 "Parameter/process data for Profibus").
- Save the configuration.

The Profibus-specific configurations have been performed, copied to the CML and the CML is ready for measurement operation.

12.3 Parameter/process data for Profibus

12.3.1 General information on Profibus

In addition to the basic configurations (see chapter 8 "Starting up the device - Basic configuration"), the functionality of the CML is defined via the GSD modules. The necessary modules are linked and appropriately configured for the given measurement application with a user-specific PLC configuration software program.

NOTICE

Extended configuration of the CML via Profibus if the CML is operated via Profibus!

\$ If the CML is operated on a Profibus control, the extended configuration may only be performed via the Profibus.

For operation of the CML on the Profibus, all configuration parameters are set to adjustment values ex works. If you do not change these configuration parameters, the CML operates with the adjustment values set ex works by Leuze electronic on delivery. For the adjustment values set ex works, please refer to the following module descriptions.

NOTICE

Working with the GSD file modules!

- At least one module must be configured with input data from the GSD file in the fieldbus-specific configuration software, e.g., module 1 "evaluation functions (16 bit)".
- Some programmable logic controls make available a so-called "universal module". This module is used for control purposes and must not be activated for the CML.




14.1 Connection configuration

Independent of the selected process interface, each CML measuring light curtain can be operated and adjusted using the configuration software from Leuze electronic on a PC.

- Sconnect the USB master to the plug-in power supply unit or the mains supply.
- Street Connect the IO-Link USB master to the CML receiver on the X1 interface.
 - Included in the delivery contents of USB master is a USB connection cable for connecting the PC to the USB master as well as a plug-in power supply unit and a short description.

The USB master is equipped with an M12 connector (4-pin).

14.2 Installation requirements on the PC

- At least 20MB of free disk space if Microsoft .NET Framework 2.0 and Adobe Acrobat Reader are already installed
- At least 150MB free disk space if Microsoft .NET Framework 2.0 and Adobe Acrobat Reader are not already installed
- Microsoft XP with SP3 as operating system and Microsoft .NET Framework 2.0 or higher
- Free USB 1.1 or USB 2.0 interface
- The IO-Link Device Tool software was developed exclusively for use with the Microsoft Windows XP operating system. It should, however, also run with Windows 2000.

15 Troubleshooting

15.1 What to do in case of failure?

After switching on the measuring light curtain, display elements (see chapter 3.4 "Display elements") assist in checking the proper function and troubleshooting.

In case of failure, you can determine the fault from the LED displays. With the error message you can determine the cause of the fault and initiate measures to rectifying it.

NOTICE

If the light curtain responds with an error display, you will often be able to eliminate the cause yourself!

- Switch off the system and leave it switched off.
- Analyze and eliminate the cause of the fault using the following table.
- \$ If you are unable to rectify the fault, contact the Leuze electronic branch responsible for you or call the Leuze electronic customer service (see chapter 17 "Service and support", Service and support).

During teaching, the system checks whether the signals of all beams are within a certain corridor. If there are considerable deviations in the signal strength, this results in a teaching error and is indicated on the LEDs. The cause may be partial soiling of the lens cover.

Measure: clean the lens covers on the transmitter and receiver!

16 Care, maintenance and disposal

16.1 Cleaning

In the event of dust build-up on the sensor:

Clean the sensor with a soft cloth; use a cleaning agent (commercially available glass cleaner) if necessary.

NOTICE

Do not use aggressive cleaning agents!

Do not use aggressive cleaning agents such as thinner or acetone for cleaning the measuring light curtains.

Use of improper cleaning agents can damage the lens cover.

16.2 Servicing

The measuring light curtain does not usually require any maintenance by the operator.

Repairs to the device must only be carried out by the manufacturer.

Solution For repairs, contact your responsible Leuze electronic subsidiary or Leuze electronic customer service (see chapter 17 "Service and support").

18.2 Timing

In principle, the individual beams are always processed sequentially for measuring light curtains. The internal controller starts transmitter 1 and then activates only the corresponding receiver 1 to measure the received light power. If the measured value exceeds the switch-on threshold, this first beam is evaluated as an active beam.

The time between activation of the transmitter and evaluation in the receiver is referred to as the response time per beam. In the CML 730i, this is = $10 \, \mu s$. The evaluation of all beams and transfer to the interface takes place at a defined rate.

The total cycle time is thus calculated as follows:

Cycle time = number of beams x response time per beam + constant

Example: cycle time = 192 beams x 0.01 ms + 0.15 ms = 2.17 ms

18.2.1 Limits for detecting objects

The detection of objects and the evaluation of the data depend on the following factors:

- · Minimum object diameter or minimum object size for stationary objects
- · Boundary conditions for pure detection of moving objects
- · Transmission rate of the data bytes
- · Cycle time of the PLC

Minimum object diameter for stationary objects

The minimum object diameter of a stationary object is determined by the beam spacing and optic diameter. Minimum object size for parallel-beam operation:

Because objects must also be reliably detected in the transition area between two beams, the following relations apply.

Beam spacing	Minimum object size	
5 mm	Beam spacing + 5 mm	= 10 mm








Figure 18.3: BT-2L mounting bracket




Figure 18.4: BT-2Z parallel bracket




Figure 18.5: BT-2R1 swivel mount (shown in two mounting views)




Figure 18.6: BT-2SSD and BT-2SSD-270 swiveling mounting brackets




Figure 18.7: BT-2P40 clamp bracket




Figure 19.1: Electrical connection for IO-Link devices/analog devices
